The North Dakota Century Code 43-12.1-08 provides for the following duties of the Board of Nursing:

43-12.1-08. DUTIES OF THE BOARD. The board shall regulate the practice of nursing. Regulation of the practice of nursing must ensure that a person may not practice or offer to practice nursing or use titles of advanced practice registered nurse, specialty practice registered nurse, registered nurse, licensed practical nurse, or unlicensed assistive person, or titles of a similar nature which denote the practice of nursing to the general public unless licensed or registered as provided in this chapter.

- 1. Enforce this chapter.
- 2. Adopt rules necessary to administer this chapter after collaborating and consulting with North Dakota nursing associations and other affected parties.

The joint statement included requirements set forth by the National Transportation Safety Board to address opioid prescribing. Currently, the joint statement is being reviewed for adoption by ND Board of Nursing, ND Board of Pharmacy, and ND Board of Medicine.

The Board developed an annual budget for receipts and expenditures. Appendix II includes a statement of the 2017-2018 receipts and expenditures. An audit of receipts and expenditures is performed at the end of each fiscal year and submitted by the auditor to the Governor's office. Completed audit reports are available for review at the board office.

5. Collect and analyze data regarding nursing education, nursing practice, and nursing resources.

The Board collects data annually from all approved nursing education programs and provides a Nursing Education Annual Report to the Governor. The Board collects data related to nurse licensure through database with initial, renewal, and reactivation application processes. The Board participates in the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) Commitment to Ongoing Regulatory Excellence (CORE) program to develop and monitor a set of comparative measures to assess the performance of state boards of nursing. The Board participates in Board Membership Profile which includes data collection through survey of 59 Member Boards of the NCSBN.

The Board collaborated with ND Center for Nursing (CFN) and provided funding for the operations. The Board Executive Director and a Board member are on the Board of Directors for CFN. The Board directors and members participated on CFN committees and workgroups.

Dr. Patricia Moulton, CFN Executive Director, provided a presentation at the April 2018 Board meeting to give updates on the Strategic Plan and budget. The Board provided feedback and suggestions.

In April 2018, the Board accepted action item assignments for the Governor's Nursing Workforce Shortage Taskforce and supported the use of necessary staff resources to complete the assignments. Action items included: 1) provide a comparison between ND and other states of require practice and contact hours; and 2) participate with team assigned to promote development of remote nursing education program sites to address rural needs.

6. Issue and renew limited licenses or registration to individuals requiring accommodation to practice nursing.

NDAC chapter 54-02-09 related to a limited license became effective September 1, 1996. One individual was issued a

limited license for the fiscal year 2017-2018.

7. Establish a nursing student loan program funded by license fees to encourage individuals to enter and advance in the nursing profession.

- The Nursing Education Committee (NEC) met four times during the 2017-2018 fiscal year. Board members: Janelle Holth, RN, Mary Beth Johnson, RN, Dr. Tanya Spilovoy. External members: Sara Berger, RN, Janet Johnson, RN, Nicole Roed, RN and Judy Smith, RN.
- July 2017 approved individuals for the nursing education loan (NEL) for a total awarded of \$88, 871.00.
- July 2017 approved requests for NEL repayment deferments for two graduate nurses until January 2018.
- November 2018 granted \$500 NEL to a nurse pending acceptance into a board approved LPN refresher course and receipt of required nursing education loan documentation.

10. Conduct and support projects pertaining to nursing education and practice.

- Successful US Department of Education survey gaining renewal of recognition through 2022.
- January 2018 approved policy and procedure for PVR intake, investigation and disposition. The redesign of the policy and procedure included several months of research, monitoring trends, and considerations of Compliance Division and CAC.
- Board convened an advisory panel to address multiple inquiries and concerns related to RNs and anesthetic
 agents, specifically ketamine for various uses. A Board member was appointed as chair. The advisory panel
 reviewed literature, current trends, and recommended revisions of 2 current board practice statements. The
 outcome of the advisory panel included recommendations to the directors and CAC. The board adopted the new
 "Role of RN in analgesia/sedation" and retired the prior 2 practice statements.
- Participated in planning the ND CFN 2018 Annual Conference and upcoming Nurse Legislative Day at the Capitol.
- Collaborated with ND CFN to host the April 2018 regulatory conference in Mandan, ND titled, "ND Nursing Regulatory Excellence Conference: Safe Nursing Practice in an Ever-Changing World".
- January 2018 directed staff and board members to collaborate with ND CFN Medical Marijuana Tracking Team with reports to the board.
- Board participated in the ND Tri-Regulator Collaborative and NDUS Envision 2030.

ADMINISTRATION OF THE NATIONAL NURSE AIDE ASSESSMENT PROGRAM

The NNAAP Examination is a nationally administered certification program. NNAAP is an assessment instrument to determine competency for eligibility and enrollment on the North Dakota certified nurse aide registry. Pearson VUE, a leading international educational publisher and assessment company continues to provide testing services for the North Dakota Board of Nursing. The NNAAP examination was previously co-developed and maintained by both Pearson VUE and NCSBN (National Council State Boards of Nursing). As of January 2009, NCSBN purchased the NNAAP examination and going forward will be developed and maintained solely by NCSBN.

CONTINUING EDUCATION AUDIT 2017 REPORT

Continuing education was mandated in 2003 for license renewal in North Dakota. Nurses are randomly selected for audit annually. During the 2017 renewal period, a request for audit was generated through the online renewal process to obtain a random sample of 204 nurses who renewed for the licensure period and verified completion of 12 contact hours of continuing education. The 204 nurses were asked to submit documents to verify completion of the required contact hours for the previous 2 years by furnishing a copy of the verification of attendance for the earned contact hours. The majority of nurses met the continuing education requirements by obtaining the appropriate number of contact hours.

LPN IV Therapy Courses 2017-2018:

- April 2018 granted Northland Community & Technical College, LPN Intravenous Therapy course full approval until April 2022; and required a paper survey in 2022 for continued approval.
- 13. **Adopt and enforce rules for nursing practices.** See page 3, "Adopt rules necessary to administer this chapter after collaborating and consulting with North Dakota nursing associations and other affected parties".
- 14. Issue practice statements regarding the interpretation and application of this chapter.
 - July 2017 reviewed applications for licensure by endorsement for licensees who have been licensed and practicing
 in other states by completing military training and were licensed by equivalency. ND law and rules and national
 trends were reviewed. Equivalency was discussed in relation to ND law, and Board indicated preference for options

43-12.1-09 Initial licensure and registration.

The board shall license and register nursing applicants. The board shall adopt rules establishing qualifications for initial licensure and registration. The Board of Nursing contracts with the National Council of State Boards of Nursing, Inc. to use the NCLEX-RN® examination and NCLEX-PN® examination. Computerized adaptive testing is the method used to administer the NCLEX-RN® examination and NCLEX-PN® examination. A biennial license cycle is followed for registered nurses and licensed practical nurses. Newly licensed nurses shall receive a license expiring on December thirty-first of the following licensure year. The Board of Nursing maintains a permanent electronic file of licenses or registrations issued to registered nurses, licensed practical nurses and the unlicensed assistive person. The file is open to the public.

43-12.1-17 Nursing Education Programs.

The board shall adopt and enforce administrative rules establishing standards for nursing education programs leading to initial or advanced licensure. In-state programs must be approved by the board. Out-of-state programs must be approved by the state board of nursing of the jurisdiction in which the program is headquartered. The board shall approve, review, and reapprove nursing education programs in this state. The board may not require a statement of intent as part of the approval process under this section.
